Five Initiatives GGUW's work encompasses 5 initiatives. The first initiative,

Community Investment/Community Impact, addresses the human service needs of infants to seniors through funding, shared resources and partnerships with local organizations. The final four emphasize education and well-being for youth across a cradle to career continuum.

- 1. GGUW's Community Investment/Community Impact initiative puts donor dollars "to work." Local community organizations focusing on initiatives such as financial stability, food insecurity, domestic violence, family support, mentoring, or senior care apply for funding through a grant process that assesses program goals, outcomes, transparency, accountability and financial need. Funds raised from the annual campaign are thoughtfully invested into over 60 local programs and initiatives with the goal of addressing root causes for long-term well-being in GGUW's focus areas of health, education, and income.
- 2. The kidsLINK Afterschool Program was established 18 years ago to address a community need for afterschool programming in Three Forks. Today, kidsLINK Afterschool operates in 28 locations across 5 counties providing a safe, nurturing place for more than 1,500 kids daily, kidsLINK Afterschool is the result of partnerships with school districts, MSU, libraries, Gallatin County 4-H and many other organizations.
- 3. GGUW is the fiscal agent for and convenes the Montana Afterschool Alliance (MTAA) a statewide network of afterschool stakeholders whose goal is to improve quality, increase access and support sustainability of out-of-school-time programs in Montana. MTAA was launched in 2014 when GGUW was awarded a 3-year grant from the C.S. Mott Foundation, with matching funds from others, to become the nation's 43rd afterschool network.
- 4. The Early Childhood Community Council (ECCC) is a community-wide collaborative effort to promote thriving children from birth to age eight. The ECCC provides leadership to community partners with the goal of creating an efficient, effective and comprehensive system of early childhood services to ensure that every child has a healthy and enriched beginning. In 2014, ECCC received a 5-year "Project LAUNCH" grant to support the social-emotional needs of 0-8 year olds in Gallatin and Park counties.
- 5. Graduation Matters Gallatin is a community/school partnership working to ensure that students in Gallatin and Park counties stay in school and graduate from high school ready for college or career. The coalition's focus is "Attendance Matters," with the goal of improving students' attendance in school. GMG is part of the Graduation Matters Montana initiative sponsored by the Montana Office of Public Instruction.
